## 379 / 24 CORNWALL COUNCILLOR UPDATES –

#### Cornwall Councillor Jane Pascoe reported: -

"Today at Full Council we voted on approving the budget and it was resolved that the Cornwall Council element of Council Tax be increased by 2.99% plus a levy of 2% to be spent solely on Adult Social Care. The vote was

The Town Vision workshop was well attended, and some interesting points were raised. I didn't think enough time was given to the positive issues in the town, but I do think it may galvanise people in to talking and thinking about the future of their town. At the public meeting it was disappointing that some of our own Town Councillors spoke negatively about the town. They must be reminded that over £1 million has been invested in the library, £millions in the development of the redundant cattle market site, a new Police Station and further funding for the renovation of the Guildhall and the new Skate Park. In addition to investment to the extension of the town Medical Practice, demolition of redundant ATS, Coronation Hall and St Ambulance buildings to accommodate a bus terminal. Not forgetting the Front facing services in the Integrated Service Hub, which could easily have gone to Bodmin, St

On the 21st February I was pleased to attend the opening of the front desk facility in the Liskeard Police Station. I believe this will be welcomed by the residents as it will be a safe place for them to report crimes and or seek advice. Residents must be encouraged to use this facility, use it or lose it.

Austell or Truro. Shame on anyone who says Liskeard is standing still.

On Saturday, I joined the Forest for Cornwall Team handing out over 700 trees to residents. The trees included Hazel, Rowan, Crab Apple, Wild Pear, Cherry/Plum, Red Wood and Whitebeam. The queue went along Dean Street and it was encouraging to see so many people willing to support the project to increase the number of trees in Cornwall.

Peninsula Transport – Implementation of Strategic Plan. Sadly failing Liskeard in connectivity by public transport to the hospital and health services. Ends 3rd March please take part in the consultation and comment.

Mt Edgecumbe, owned jointly by Plymouth Coty Council and Cornwall Council hae had a serious incident involving the fire in the Barrow Centre. Huge thanks to the 40 firefighters who worked through the night to put out the fire. Staff accommodation was destroyed. Please support the park."

#### – Cornwall Councillor Nick Craker reported: -

"Cornwall Council approved their budget which represented a 2.99% increase for the Council and 2% for Adult Social Care. The plans include an increase of £22 million in the council's net spending on care for adults and children. Huge savings have had to be found across the Council to focus on services the Council legally have to provide like social care, SEND and home to school transport. £250,000 had been found to support the development of a highway upgrade to the Plusha junction on the A30 which was now one of the most dangerous junctions in the country.

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RIO who run Liskeard Library had one of their cornerstone NEET programmes come to an end and conversations were ongoing with Cornwall Council to ensure the library can continue to grow and develop its services. It would be good for all Liskeard Town Councillors to catch up with RIO soon, to understand how they are operating and their future plans".
